Crash inspired Salt's dream

Within hours of a devastating motorcycle crash in June 2011 near Cochrane, Michelle Salt sat in her hospital bed and started to plan the next chapter of her life.

She always enjoyed speed and competition, so she decided to dedicate herself to representing her country somehow. The only things standing in her way were tibia and fibula fractures and breaks in her pelvis, hips, vertebrae and clavicle. Her right leg was also amputated.

The other roadblock for the Leduc native was figuring out what sport she would compete in, an issue she wasn't really thinking about until Greg Westlake, a veteran of the Canadian national sledge hockey team, paid her a visit in hospital. He had been attending a training camp in Edmonton and drove south to give her a pep talk.

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"He's like, 'all right Michelle, here's how it goes. It will take you about three years to

make a national team once you pick your sport,' " said Salt, reminiscing about her conversation with Westlake in 2011. "He said 'it will take you five years before you are actually going to any Games, depending on where the Games fall'. So I am thinking, based on that information, 2014 wasn't realistic. Well, 2016 is possible if I pick summer sport. So I thought about 2018. He said to go on to the Paralympic website and pick a sport."

She decided on snowboarding – which wasn't yet an official Paralympic sport, so her focus was on 2018.

She continued to progress and was eventually named to the national snowboard team, and less than 11 months after her accident, the International Paralympic Committee added the sport to the Sochi Paralympics.

"On March 16, 2014, I was the second female to ever drop into the course in Sochi and I became the first ever Canadian Olympic Paralympic snowboarder," said Salt, who was ninth. "It was an incredible experience. I completed my goal in two and a half years."

Despite her drive and determination, Salt had inspiration every step of the way.

"The biggest thing was the community that I had around me when I was there and as I was getting there," said Salt, who had five surgeries and spent seven days on lift support. "Everyone was so incredibly supportive, including WinSport and everything they do for the athletes, and the Canadian Paralympic Committee. It just felt like I wasn't there alone, that I had a whole family with me, watching every move and cheering me on."

Competing in Sochi is just one step along the way for Salt. She wants to focus on the 2018 Winter Paralympics in PyeongChang and perhaps even training for cycling at the 2016 Summer Paralympics in Rio de Janeiro.

"Snowboarding is number one to me and I will put it first. It's just depending on what my schedule looks like for the summer for snowboarding, since we do summer camps," said Salt. "I think that's going to determine everything, and whether I am willing to put the effort in."

Top Canadian biathletes set to battle in Canmore

Some of Canada's top biathletes are converging on the Canmore Nordic Centre over the next week to battle in the International Biathlon Union's Cup 7 and Cup 8.

Several athletes who have trained at WinSport Canmore, including Olympians Zina Kocher of Red Deer and Scott Perras of Regina, will be among the athletes from 18 countries competing in five international competitions Saturday and Sunday, then on March 4 and March 6-7.

"It will be great to race at home," said Kocher, who competed for Canada at the 2006 Olympics in Torino, 2010 Olympics in Vancouver and the 2014 Games in Sochi, Russia.

"Canmore typically has fast conditions because of the man-made snow. It sets a really hard

pack. The course is in top shape for fast speeds and the times will be really tight, because it's not a course that really divides people. There aren't any huge hills, but you're working all the time."

The Canadian contingent features a total of 14 athletes, including seven men and seven women, battling in three sprint events, one individual competition and a mixed relay.

In addition to Kocher and Perras, Olympian Marc-Andre Valcartier will also represent Canada, along with Claude Godbout (Quebec); Emma Lunder (Vernon, B.C.); Leilani Tam Von Burg (Ottawa); Erin Yungblut (Wroxeter, Ont.); Melanie Schultz (Canmore); and Sarah Beaudry (Prince George, B.C.) in the women's races. Representing the men are Macx Da-

vies (Canmore), Matthew Neuman (Prince George, B.C.); Matthew Hudec (North Battleford, Sask.); Andrew Chisholm (Calgary); and Aidan Miler (Canmore).

"Hosting international competitions at home is a critical component to growing our sport across the country, and we hope Canadians will join us in what promises to be an entertaining week of competition," said Chris Lindsay, the high-performance director for Biathlon Canada.

Canada last hosted an IBU Cup race in 2012 and 2009. The series is a feeder series for some of the top biathletes, many of which compete in both IBU Cup races and World Cup races.

Canmore is on the schedule to host a World Cup race in 2016.
